Happy New Year to all. We are proud of the work we have done through the pandemic thus far, and especially thankful to **Zoe Tripolitis** for the support she rendered over the past two years of distant interactions with members. The

new year brings renewed hope of having HUC as the leading organization in the Delaware Valley to promote paideia. 

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# HUC SCHOLARSHIPS 2022-2023

The Hellenic University Club of Philadelphia is pleased to announce the 2022-2023 HUC Scholarships that will be offered to students of Greek descent and to those pursuing a degree in Greek Studies regardless of heritage. This year we will offer 16 undergraduate and graduate scholarships totaling \$58,500.

We have exciting changes and an addition to our scholarship opportunities this academic year.

A new scholarship, the **Eleutheria Scholarship of the Philadelphia VFW Post 6633** in the amount of \$5,000, will be offered to children of VFW Eleutheria Post 6633 of Philadelphia and their descendants.

Two of our scholarship donors will combine and increase their scholarships: Catherine Hetos Skefos and Stephanie Hetos Cocke, daughters of Drs. Nicholas S. Hetos and Maria Galanos Hetos, are merging and offering the **Nicholas S. # EDITOR'S EYE

**I**t was Socrates who said the unexamined life is not worth living. I, too, embraced this mantra for years as a journalist. And in my past few months as your Corresponding Secretary, it has fueled my wonderment about what makes this Club tick 86 years after its founding. This is why I am introducing this newsletter feature, "Editor's Eye."

At least through the duration of my term I intend to use this space in conversation with you -- fellow members. Along the way, hopefully, we will toy with two questions: What do you consider the essence of the Hellenic University Club? And what, in your heart of hearts, does belonging to this organization really mean to you?

For my first installment, I am sharing reflections from a recent conversation with a new HUC member who has Club roots dating to its founding in 1936: Dr. Paul Apostolidis. A scholar at the London School of Economics by way of Radnor Township public schools, Paul joined HUC a few months ago in tribute to his grandparents, HUC cofounders Dr. Nicholas Padis and wife Kively. He also will be delivering an HUC lecture later this month on immigration for us. From Paul's perch as associate professorial lecturer in LSE's Department of Government in London, he graciously welcomed my call and queries.

Why, I wanted to know, had he joined our Club and

from so far away? The answer, as I suspected, was deeply personal.

"I'm really proud of the way my grandparents and their friends back in the '30s had the motivation to create an institutional basis for the community and raised people's aspirations," Paul said.

Dr. Padis had nothing of material value when he came to the United States fleeing wartime conditions in Greece. But he became a prominent Lankenau Hospital physician years later. Paul's grandmother, too, filled a considerable void by reportedly becoming the first Greek American to graduate from Smith College.

"My grandfather," Paul said, "is just lionized in our family."

I was giddy to be on the phone. Two onetime HUC scholarship recipients, both of us, now sharing stories.

I told Paul that his pappou used to come into my father, Christo's, Upper Darby sandwich shop when I was little. My apron-clad dad would be rapt as they exchanged indecipherable whispers over an Ariston Deli side counter. When my father died, my mother chose a cemetery plot a few headstones away from where Dr. Padis had been laid to rest. She had done so deliberately. When she, too, died soon after, my sisters and I passed Paul's pappou to say goodbye to our Panagiotia. Today, there is no visiting the Panaritis headstone without first passing the Padis headstone.

"Garrulous and a great spirit," is how Paul described his pappou. "He had this confidence in himself and generosity. He was very philosophical."

Nicholas Padis came to the United States at age 14 from the island of Lesbos and settled in Boston in 1914. It was a time of great volatility in and around Greece. Lesbos was perilously close to the Turkish coast. The Balkan Wars had just ended, and Greece and Turkey were jockeying over land that each believed they were due. For much the same reason Kively, at about age 6, immigrated around 1916 to New Brunswick, N.J., with her family. Things were just as dicey in Ephesus, their home along the western coast of what now is modern-day Turkey.

"They were war refugees," Paul said. Both squeaked out before Greece entered World War I.

There is family lore about how young Nicholas tended to goats as a child on the island. In Boston as a teen, he worked at a tire factory and as a waiter, squirreling away enough cash to bring his two sisters, his mother and his father over from Greece. He even earned enough to set his father up with his own shoe repair shop.

“Somehow,” Paul continued, his pappou also got a scholarship to Boston University. Then came a medical degree. Friendships with other Greek immigrants working their way into American society through higher education. And, eventually, a staff position at Lankenau, which brought him to Philadelphia. It was there that Dr. Padis met his bride around 1930.

Kively was a medical researcher at the hospital, which had not yet moved to Lower Merion Township from its Philadelphia location. Her professional achievement was extraordinary in its own right given that her parents were factory workers. She and Nicholas settled down and raised a family in Drexel Hill.

The story of HUC’s founding need not be recounted here in full. It is well known that Nicholas and Kively were among those who brought it into existence, their belief unbreakable that much good comes from learning while living.

When Paul’s own mother, Daphne Padis Apostolidis of Newtown Square, died in April 2021 at age 84, he realized it was time to carry the baton. Some years earlier, Paul had helped her move out of the family’s Rosemont home, only to find among his mother’s most cherished belongings a trove of Club mementos dating back decades.

“It was clear that HUC meant a lot to her,” Paul said. “She kept everything from HUC events – anything that mentioned my yiayia or pappou.”

A onetime political campaign strategist, Paul has long since shifted toward academic work that seeks to link the theories about how political power works to concrete action improving people’s lives. He sees parallels between his own vocation and the HUC work of his grandfather and those keeping our Club vibrant a century later.

“I see my pappou and my yiayia as being real exemplars of civic engagement, by founding the Club, by helping open St. Luke’s church, by other things they did,” he said. “In that same spirit, my teaching has a strong emphasis on increasing civic engagement among students. They earn academic credit for doing research in partnership with community organizations on important public issues.”

What most stayed with me after this conversation with Paul were the deeply loving memories that spoke less about his pappou’s credentials, less about the architecture of his ascent, than about the humanity that drove everything about Dr. Padis.

“He was just incredibly hardworking, with a great heart and soul for people,” Paul said.

Head. Heart. Soul. A holy trinity, you might even say, embodying the very essence of *paideia*.

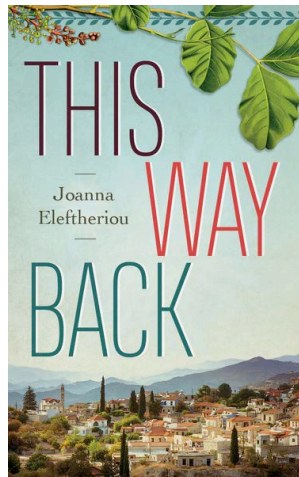
Author **Joanna Eleftheriou** joins HUC members for a lecture about her memoir, a collection of essays titled, ***This Way Back: From New York to Cyprus and Back***, on Thursday, February 10, at 7 p.m.

Joanna moved from New York City to a Greek-Cypriot village, a journey dramatically captured as a coming-of-age experience for a professional, feminist woman seeking a way to remain part of the Greek Orthodox Church both in the United States and Cyprus. Joanna will read from the essay “Ithacas” and discuss the process of sharing her Greek-Cypriot-American experience with a broad readership and fielding questions such as: What does it mean to go “back home” when you are Greek-American? Are we on a journey back to our Greek and Cypriot homelands, or searching for any place that will make us feel like we belong? How do we keep alive the traditions of our homelands as we emerge as modern Greek-Americans of the twenty-first century?

Joanna is an assistant professor of English at Christopher Newport University, a contributing editor of *Assay: A Journal of Nonfiction Studies* and a faculty member at the Writing Workshops in Greece. Her essays, short stories, and translations appear regularly in journals including *Apalachee Review*, *Chautauqua*, *CutBank*, *Arts and Letters*, and *The Common*. She serves in the Executive Board of the *Modern Greek Studies Association* and was book review editor for the *Journal of Modern Greek Studies*.

### SCHOLARSHIPS FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Applicants must be enrolled full-time in a degree program at an accredited four-year college or university, or they must be high school seniors accepted for enrollment in such a degree program, and have outstanding academic qualifications. Please note that some scholarships have special eligibility requirements.

(a) Scholarships that require demonstrated financial need:

- **Dr. Michael Dorizas Memorial Scholarship**, honoring the late Dr. Michael Dorizas, a widely respected educator, lecturer and athlete. **\$5,000**
- **Founders Scholarship**, honoring the founders of the Hellenic University Club of Philadelphia. **\$5,000**
- **Dimitri J. Ververelli Memorial Scholarship for Architecture and/or Engineering**, offered to a qualified student pursuing a degree in the field of Architecture or Engineering. This scholarship was established by Mrs. Anastasia Ververelli to honor her husband, Dimitri J. Ververelli, a past president of the Hellenic University Club of Philadelphia. **\$3,000**
- **George C. Liacouras Memorial Scholarship**, offered to a qualified student pursuing an undergraduate degree at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. Established by Mrs. Effie Liacouras, this scholarship honors her husband, George C. Liacouras. **\$5,000**
- **Theresa A. Chletcos Memorial Scholarship**, offered to a qualified student pursuing an undergraduate degree in the field of education. Established in 2013, this award honors past president and founding member, Theresa A. Chletcos. This scholarship was funded through a bequest of Theresa A. Chletcos and her friends and family. **\$2,000**

### SCHOLARSHIPS FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS

Applicants may be graduate students enrolled full time in or senior undergraduates accepted to a graduate program at an accredited university or professional school. Applicants must intend to enroll full time in Fall 2022. Postdocs (post PhD) are not eligible. Please note that some scholarships have special eligibility requirements.

(a) The following scholarship does not require any financial information:

- **Dr. Nicholas Padis Memorial Graduate Scholarship**. Academic excellence is the primary consideration for this scholarship. Established in 1986, this annual award honors Philadelphia physician, first president and founding member of the Hellenic University Club of Philadelphia, Dr. Nicholas Padis. **\$5,000**

(b) Scholarships that require demonstrated financial need:

- **John S. Manos, Esq. Memorial Graduate Scholarship**, offered to a qualified student pursuing studies leading to a Juris Doctor (JD) Degree. Established in 2009, this annual award honors John Stanley Manos, Esq., Philadelphia lawyer and long-time member of the Hellenic University Club of Philadelphia. This scholarship is funded by the family and friends of John S. Manos. **\$2,000**

- **Dr. Peter A. Theodos Memorial Graduate Scholarship**, offered to a qualified student pursuing studies leading to a Doctor of Medicine (MD) Degree. This award honors Dr. Nicholas S. Hetos, Philadelphia dentist, past president and founding member of the Hellenic University Club of Philadelphia and Maria G. Hetos, EdD, an educator and past president of the Club. This scholarship is funded by their daughters Catherine Hetos Skefos and Stephanie Hetos Cocke. **\$5,000**
- **Kathleen and Nicholas Fisfis Graduate Scholarship**, offered to a qualified student pursuing studies leading to a Graduate or Post Graduate Degree in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics or Medicine. Established in 2016, this annual award is funded by Kathleen and Nicholas Fisfis. **\$7,500**

This annual award is funded by Antoinette Gianopulos, friends and family in memory of Nicholas Gianopulos. **\$5,000**. *Preference will be given to candidates who have financial need.*
- **Eleutheria Scholarship of the Philadelphia VFW Post 6633**, offered to children of the VFW Eleutheria Post 6633 of Philadelphia and their descendants. This scholarship recognizes the importance of the VFW organization and the contributions of its members to our society and especially our Philadelphia community. Applicants (Graduate and Undergraduate) must be of Greek descent, U.S. citizens or lawful permanent residents of Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lancaster, Lehigh, Montgomery, Northampton or Philadelphia Counties in Pennsylvania; Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Mercer, Monmouth, Ocean or Salem Counties in New Jersey; New Castle County in Delaware. Students who are declared majors in Greek Studies may also apply, regardless of their heritage.
